Multiple Choice

- 1. Thesis (i.e. position or main contention)
 - a. The thesis was extremely clear and precise.
 - b. The thesis was generally understandable.
 - c. The thesis was only hinted at.
 - d. The thesis was not state clearly.

2. Support and evidence

- a. The thesis was supported through the use of details, examples, and citations.
- b. The thesis was generally well supported.
- c. The thesis was could use more support.
- d. The thesis lacked supporting evidence. Generalizations were a problem.

3. Overall Organization

- a. The paper was well organized, ideas well expressed, and the paper followed a logical progression.
- b. The paper organization was acceptable and one could follow the ideas and logic.
- c. The paper could have been better organized, could have been expressed ideas more clearly, and the progression of ideas could have been more logical.
